THE 1619 PROJECT

Remember the name Nichole Hannah-Jones. She is one of the most prolific writers at the intersection of race and public policy. She has won a McArthur Grant, a National Magazine Award, a Peabody, and a Polk Award. This African American woman is a correspondent for the *New York Times* and the creator of the 1619 Project.

She brought to her editors the idea of celebrating the 400th Anniversary of slavery in America. The enslavement of Africans fueled the economic and political powerhouse that the United States became, supporting the agricultural economy, picking the cotton, even building the nation's capital.

Her editors at the *N Y Times* embraced her idea, that a national initiative is important to commemorate the 400th Anniversary of slavery in America. They embellished it and gave her a central role, sending her on a nation-wide tour that is currently in progress. The project was launched in New York City on August 13; it was in Detroit September 4, and in Chicago on October 7. I am sure a coalition of African American organizations can get her here too

The August 18 issue of the *New York Times* produced a 1619 project supplement. Its articles examine the story of slavery in America and the many ways that its legacy continues to define our nation.

To learn more about this project, type "1619 Project" in your browser search window. You will find Hannah-Jones being interviewed on news channels KQED, CNN, and others; the entire 1619 Project supplement published in the *New York Times*; and resources for teachers to share with their students. Hannah-Jones put these documents online to be accessible to people who do not subscribe to the journal.

Here is the story. Four hundred years ago, on August 20, 1619, a ship carrying about 20 enslaved Africans arrived in Point Comfort, in the British Colony of Virginia. The *New York Times*, a respected News organization, had the information vetted by an independent panel of experts, particularly since this information is potentially explosive. History books will need to be revised to show that African Americans arrived before the 1620 *Mayflower*, when the pilgrims arrived. Those first Africans arrived in 1619, the year before!

**NEGRO TRAILBLAZERS OF CALIFORNIA
DELILAH BEASLEY**

Published in 1919, "Negro Trail Blazers of California" is a monumental history of African Americans who first came with Spaniards in the 1770s, through 1915, a first of its kind. It describes a who's who of Negro pioneers, the work they did to advance equality in the State, and uphold culture, education, various professions, and civil rights, including the human right to freedom. The Society co-sponsored the 1968 reprinting. Now over one hundred years old, the book is found in most libraries and digitally at several websites.

On October 20, Shawna Sherman of the San Francisco Public Library and Ginger Smyly of the Society gave a presentation about the book, the author, Delilah Beasley, and some unknown stories at the main branch. The presentation will be made available again during Black History Month 2020.

SOCIETY ARCHIVE TREASURES

At the end of an afternoon of sifting through documents from the last 7 decades, a final box of the day was pulled off the shelf. Entrusted to us in the late 1990s, we uncovered the story of the three Mansfield brothers who all served in W.W. I., two as sailors and one in the infantry. We found snapshots of African American soldiers in uniform at Verdun and Longuyon, dated 1919; shots of various ships at various ports, one decorated with flags, and labeled, "November 11, 1918;" clippings of newspaper articles written about and by Charles and Otis from the field; typed letters from Charles to his mother from France; and more. As I held these photos, it dawned on me, "These are one hundred years old."
